

To set up usage notifications in your MyTriCountyTX app:

- ►click the "More" button in the bottom right corner
- ► click on "Settings" and tap on "Contact Methods" to choose how to receive notifications
- ►once the terms and conditions have been accepted and the phone number or email is verified, tap "Settings" in the upper left corner
- ►click "Manage Notifications" and tap "Usage"
- ▶from there it will show "Not Enrolled"
- simply click "Not Enrolled" and slide the activation button to the right
- ►a success message will then pop up verifying that usage alerts are activated

POLE INSPECTIONS AND MAINTENANCE

Strong, sturdy utility poles ensure a reliable electric system, which is why we routinely inspect the poles on our lines. Throughout the year, our crews and contractors check poles for decay caused by exposure to the elements. They know which poles are oldest and conduct inspections through a rotational process. Typically, a standard wooden distribution pole is expected to last more than 50 years.
